When I first met Sharif 10 years ago, he was not going to school, crawling in the dirt at his home village. At 17 years of age, Sharif now independently zooms his red racer to primary school. He has missed a lot of school since he didn't have a way to get there. His wooden wheelchair had been too big for him to move, so occasionally his brothers/ friends would push him to school. Sometimes his mom would carry him, as she knew education was important. After growing this past year, he could now maneuver it by himself. We spiffed up his wooden wheelchair, giving him new cushions and coverings for his "racer" and painted it bright red, his request. Upon delivery this year, we all clapped as he raced around and waved to us! Now he proudly races down the dirt road to beat his friends to school.

To school he will roll!



Highlights of MCV's Accomplishments from MCV's Director: Felix Chirombo

- Currently MCV supports 2,934 orphans and vulnerable children.
- 154 orphans/vulnerable children are sponsored to attend Gracious Secondary School. 150 students have completed the new technical training program quickly giving them valuable skills to earn a living.
- 500 bags of beans and 680 50 kg bags of maize were distributed to families in 2023 to help with food shortages.
- The Special Needs Program provided support to over 500 children in the Cerebral Palsy Clinic and built or repaired almost 200 adaptive chairs or devices.
- There are 37 irrigation project sites with about 15 families each. In addition to treadle pumps, solar pumps are now being used. These enhanced farming allows more than 500 families to benefit from increased crop yield.
- 120 goats were distributed to 40 families to kick off the 'Goat Pass-On Project' supporting more sustainable food sources
- MCV gave out 363 bed nets and 200 blankets to vulnerable children. Five homes were constructed, and 32 were repaired for those families keeping orphans.

SPECIAL NEEDS PROGRAM UPDATE

After 16 years operating, the Special Needs Program continues to grow and develop! Here are some of last years successes!

- Under the amazing guidance of Dr Bente, the Mangochi District Hospital team (physician, nutritionist, social worker and physical therapist) assesses every child at the Cerebral Palsy (CP) Clinic at MCV weekly. This collaboration provides comprehensive care for each child's needs.
- MCV has expanded their support for special needs students who are deaf, supporting 4 students at Mua School for the Deaf. There are only 3 such boarding schools in Malawi.
- The Palliative Care Association of Malawi, through Mangochi District Hospital, have donated 17 wheelchairs and 'tricycles' to MCV CP Clinic. A tricycle is a manual wheelchair, hand driven by handles that rotate a bicycle chain. This chain is attached to a 3rd wheel out in front of the wheelchair. For children who struggle with a manual wheelchair, a 'tricycle' is more efficient and easier for them.
- MCV is excited to announce that they have organized, together with Mangochi District Hospital, a Family Day at MCV. This Family Day is part of acknowledging and celebrating World Cerebral Palsy Awareness Day. MCV's Family Day will bring together those living with CP and their families, as well as supporters and organizations (such as MCV), who are all working together to secure futures for children/adults with CP. There will be activities including drama, traditional dances and stories told by the families of the children.

Thanks to all the MCV donors who continue to provide support to the Special Needs Program. Donations from your hearts touch many hearts in Malawi.

GOAT PASS-ON PROJECT

In recent and ongoing disasters (cyclones, drought, heavy rains) in the Malawian villages around MCV, the poor, as well as other vulnerable groups have consistently been disproportionately affected. These factors have resulted in food insecurity to families, especially those in villages where water is not available to grow crops.

120 goats, 40 families: Creating sustainable solutions to food shortages.

In September 2024, MCV initiated their Goat Pass-On program in the local villages to increase food security in the area. As part of the project, 40 vulnerable families were selected to receive 4 goats (3 does and one buck) for 120 goats total. The first offspring from each of doe will then be passed on to another family to start their own herd. These new herds will continue the passing on pattern to grow new herds. MCV has coordinated goat husbandry training in villages to make sure the goats receive proper care and nutrition. In addition, livestock provides food, as well as income which can be used to purchase food. Another reason for the poor harvest is the decline of the soil fertility and it can be replaced with the manure from the livestock.

MCV VOLUNTEER, 10YCE

The village volunteers are part of the core program and have been in existence for the 27 years of MCV. In each of the 39 villages, where the orphans reside, there are 2 Malawian volunteers who assist the MCV field workers with information on who needs health care, orphans school attendance, any difficulties with food, housing etc. They are given a bicycle, MCV shirt, soap, and attend a monthly training session.

A volunteer for Chimatilo village since MCV's beginning in 1997, Joyce grew up there, raising 6 children and now 12 grandchildren. For 27 years, Joyce has met the needs of Chimatilo people: tending to the babies and elders, ensuring children become educated, escorting those who are sick to the local health clinic or hospital, providing bed nets from MCV for children under 5 to decrease the rate of malaria, and distributing maize, clothing, soap/oil, and other life-giving supplies to the most vulnerable families.

Joyce notes that with MCV's help, Chimatilo has seen many changes. Orphans are supported in their education through secondary school, one of the original tenets of MCV. The local schools have been upgraded. Vocational skills are offered. She sees a decrease in HIV/AIDS since villagers are willing to get tested and take necessary medicine. She attends a Volunteer monthly meeting at MCV where they provide the following information: medical issues (HIV/AIDS, cholera, skin diseases, malnutrition, etc), maternal/baby health care, pregnancy prevention options, learning about children's developmental delays. Joyce shares this information to people in her village, answering questions/ providing support. Joyce said, "I love my full-time volunteer job. We are all very grateful for MCV!"



UPDATE ON GIRLS DORMITORY

MCV AND THE PLAZA ROTARY CLUB: 23 YEARS OF COLLABORATION

The Kansas City Plaza Rotary Club's partnership with the MCV U.S. Fundraising Board and MCV began in 2001 with a house concert fundraiser. Club members and MCV fundraising board members Bill Schmidt and Elizabeth Usovicz quickly realized that MCV's mission was aligned with Rotary's international service. Elizabeth, Bill and a small committee wrote a grant for a needs assessment for MCV, which became the club's first cooperative project in 2002. The needs assessment became multiple water and sanitation/gender equity latrine project for primary schools in the 39 villages served by MCV.

Today, the Kansas City Plaza Rotary Club is collaborating with MCV and the Rotary Club of Limbe, Malawi, on a grant-funded project to ensure food security and water equity for farming through treadle pumps and agricultural techniques training project. Stay tuned for more updates!

VILLAGE PROFILE: SALUBENI

MCV's mission is to support orphans and vulnerable children in 39 villages in Malawi. This is a profile of one of those villages, Salubeni.

Children play freely in all villages. Salubeni is one of the furthest villages from MCV. It is very remote, not connected to the electricity grid, nor does it have running water. People drink water from a well.

It is one of the smallest villages. It has more than 90 households; 11 of the houses have OVC (Orphaned and Vulnerable Children) who are served by MCV. Two of the OVC children are Form Four students at MCV Gracious Secondary School.

The volunteers for the village are Benson Thambani and William Msusa. Benson has been a volunteer for 24 years, William for 4 years. Salubeni village primarily relies on rain-fed subsistence farming as its main economic activity. A small portion of irrigation farming is practiced along the stream that runs through the village. However, the changing weather patterns caused by climate change have severely impacted crop yields, leading to food shortages and hunger. The erratic rainfall and longer dry spells have made it difficult for farmers to sustain their livelihoods, heightening hunger and economic instability. Salubeni village is one of the pilot villages for the MCV Goat Pass-On program. It has four beneficiaries. We hope the goats will address this economic challenge.


